

## **Study programme: LAW (state code 01S1)**

**Professional qualification** – lawyer.

### **Aims of the study programme:**

- To develop the ability to assess one's role in the establishment of a legal state and to realise the importance to actively participate in this process;
- To develop the ability to understand the essence of constitutional law, fields of regulation and the supremacy of law as one of the indications of a democratic state;
- To develop the ability to understand the principle of the division of the powers as the essential principle of the organisation of governing;
- To teach how to use the sources of information;
- To develop the ability to provide definite legal consultations for the administration (employer) of a company, an institution, an organisation or citizens within the scope of a definite competence;
- To develop the ability to represent the interests of a company, an institution, an organisation or citizens in state institutions;
- To develop the ability to represent the interests of a company, an institution, an organisation or citizens in arbitration or in other institutions for settling pretrial disputes in Lithuania and abroad, as well as the ability to prove the administration of the employer and the client the advantages of this kind of settlement of disputes;
- to develop the ability to represent the interests of a company, an organisation or citizens in the process of execution;
- To develop the ability to prepare and correct statutory instruments and other legal documents issued by a definite institution;
- To develop the ability to work in or to manage the departments of legal, social, personnel affairs or other departments in a company, an institution or an organisation and to organise the activity of a non-governmental organisation;
- To develop the ability to ensure material and disciplinary liability in a definite company, institution or organisation;
- To develop the ability to correctly calculate and administrate taxes, to familiarise certain people with the tax system in power and the procedure of importing excise-free goods;
- To teach how to do the audit of legal activity and documentation of a company, an institution or an organisation;
- To teach how to assess the data of a legal audit and to eliminate violations of the state of legality;
- To mould the attitude to follow the requirements of professional ethics of a lawyer;
- To develop general abilities and cross-cultural attitudes;
- To foster Christian moral attitudes;
- To develop the abilities to cooperate and communicate.

### **Further prospects**

People who successfully complete the study programme of law get higher non-university education and the qualification of a lawyer which allows them to work in institutions of public administration, county administrations and in legal and other departments of different governing bodies where knowledge in law is required. According to this study programme three specialisations for lawyers are offered:

- Lawyers in social field focus their activity on social security and legal protection of the interests of the disabled or people having this status and on the organisation of social support;
- Lawyers in the field of small and medium business are directed towards the work in such companies, institutions or organisations where there is no full-time position of a lawyer because of small volume of business activity. Special attention is paid to the administration of taxes and duties, skilled drawing-up and registration of agreements, legality of legal work relations and settlement of pretrial disputes;

- Lawyers of public administration are instructed to work, manage and consult NGOs, to work as officers or office workers in municipal bodies or other public institutions.

## **Completion of the Programme**

The qualification of a lawyer is granted after students fully complete the study curriculum and successfully pass the final examination.

The students write final theses after they finish studying all the subjects of the programme, pass examinations (credit examinations) and do all the practicals of the professional activity.

The right to defend the final thesis is given to a student who has positive marks of all the credit examinations, examinations and practicals of all the subjects in the study programme.

Final theses are assessed by a qualification board on the grounds of *The Regulations of the Assessment of Final Results in Non-University Study Programmes* prepared by the Ministry of Science and Education as well as *The Instruction on the Organisation of Final Theses Defense*.

People who complete the study programme successfully are granted the certificate of higher non-university education the issue of which is regulated by the Ministry of Science and Education of the Republic of Lithuania.

## **Rules for examinations and assessment**

Some courses end up with examination while some only with a differentiated credit examination. In both cases there is a requirement that 60% of the grade is earned during the final test, while the rest 40% of the grade are distributed evaluating participation, individual work and assignments, midterm test, etc., which is upon the teacher's and his/her students' decision.

Grading is according to 10-grade system, where grades are awarded according to the following evaluations:

- The highest level of achievement (9-10) – all assignments are accomplished, necessary exhaustive and argumentative answers are provided, the optimal problem solutions are provided, theoretical and practical knowledge is demonstrated.
- The average level of achievement (8-7) – more than 2/3 of the assignment are done, answers and problem solutions are argumentative, good theoretical and practical knowledge is demonstrated.
- The minimum necessary level of achievement (5-6) – more than half of the assignments are accomplished, the answers and problem solutions are generally acceptable, the minimum necessary theoretical and practical knowledge is demonstrated.
